Celebrating Stewart Island



Aerial photograph at Community Hall Anyone know when it was taken?

The photograph shown above rests in a corner of the Stewart Island Community Centre. It has no date on it but some clues to its age are evident:

There is no road past Butterfields Beach. Ferndale Guesthouse still stands. There is a house on the corner where the flight centre now resides.

If anyone knows when this was taken, please let Stewart know. It seems to be a full colour print and doesn't look as if it has been retouched into colour by an artist. It is framed and has probably been hanging somewhere in the past. If you want to have a look at the original, please feel free to drop into the Centre. It will be found near the door to the Gym.

Several long term residents have been asked but cannot put an exact year on the date. The nearest we have at the moment is around the mid fifties. There are some details of the photographers on the back but the most vital piece of information was omitted.

Bowling Green a Step Closer

Fund raising should start soon for the proposed resurfacing of the bowling green near the Pavilion. Agreements between the newly incorporated Stewart Island Bowling Club Inc and the Pavilion Trust have been drafted and are close to being finalised.

The construction of the green will be undertaken as a separate project from the Pavilion. When the work has been completed (est. at summer 2005/2006) the parties involved; Lions, RSA and Bowling Club, will decide on the long-term arrangements to operate the facility.

No work will be commenced until all the funding is in place, to ensure the project will be not be left partly finished.

Many bowling clubs from the Mainland are already eagerly awaiting the opportunity to visit the Island when work is finished.

As with the golf course, visitors will be able to pay a "green fee" and take advantage of another activity in Oban. Details of progress will appear regularly in S.I.N.

MUSEUM NOTES

Not a great deal to report this month, with winter bringing the usual drop in attendance. Still fairly steady, all the same.

The team of Elaine and Nancy have almost finished stage one of updating the original acquisition list, which tells us what items we've got, where they can be found, and where they came from. NEW BUILDING.

We have had meetings with the S.D.C. and Venture Southland on the possibility of a new building which would incorporate the Museum, S.D.C. office, Visitor Centre, and perhaps room to display the "Pou". Also included would be office space that Environment Southland and others could use on their occasional forays across the water.

This proposed building would be on a new site, and give us an alternative to altering our existing "home", which could then be put up for sale.

There are many problems to be dealt with, and nothing is definite, but we are keeping an open mind and discussions are "ongoing"!

This month's Boat: WANDERER.

For many years following W.W.2 the fishing fleet moored in Halfmoon Bay featured one boat with a "different" rig to the rest. Her mast was set at the after end of her cockpit, with a small derrick leading forward, which made her stand out from the rest.

She was the **WANDERER**, built by Bailey Bros. in Auckland in 1922, and used first as a Mission Launch around the Hauraki Gulf. She was a double-ender, 35' x 8'6" x 4', and built of full-length kauri planks, which meant no butts.

At the end of the war she was bought south to Stewart Island by Mick Pollock, and fished by Tim Pollock until she was sold to Garnett Hamilton. He fished her with his brother Jack until about 1949, when Garnett left the Island. He sold her to Jack, who continued fishing out of Halfmoon Bay until he retired and sold to Paul Poynton in 1970.

Paul continued crayfishing and codding out of Halfmoon Bay, and she was later used as a pleasure boat, being the Poynton's means of access to their property at Kidneyfern in Paterson Inlet.

During an easterly gale in 1987, **WANDERER** broke her mooring in Lonnekers Bay and washed ashore, becoming a total wreck.

Her original engine was a 10hp Standard, followed by a 12/24 Morris Navigator petrol engine, and lastly a 3cyl Ford Dexta diesel.

KERERU AND TUI STUDY IN SOUTHLAND

Kereru (wood pigeon) and tui are two distinctive native birds that are relatively widespread throughout Southland and can be seen in gardens, parks, planted road verges, streamsides and native bush. They provide an important means of pollinating plants and seed dispersal. Besides inhabiting the small patches of native bush scattered throughout the Southland plain the birds seek out many introduced food plants in the wider landscape such as broom, willow and winterflowering gums. These plants may be very important for the long term survival of these birds.

DOC researchers are undertaking a study on some radio- and colour-tagged kereru and tui to determine their movements, food preferences, when and where they nest, and how successful they are at rearing their young. Southland was selected as one of the study sites for this project because it still has reasonable numbers of both species present in urban and rural habitats.

Kereru Flybys

There is plenty of anecdotal evidence of kereru crossing Foveaux Strait. For example, in November 2002 there were reports of a flock of about 40 kereru in mid strait heading for the mainland. In February 2004, six kereru arrived on Raratoka (Centre) Island. They came from the direction of Stewart Island. Later that day four kereru were seen to depart Raratoka Island for Stewart Island.

Over summer DOC researchers caught several kereru in and around Invercargill city and radio-tagged them. All birds caught were also fitted with little coloured leg flags. Each bird has its own individual colour-tag combination — no two birds share the same livery.

Some of these birds have stayed put while others have dispersed to distant parts of Southland. In an attempt to track missing radio-tagged kereru the DOC staff chartered a light plane. They flew over much of Stewart Island and also the Catlins, Hokonui Hills, Longwoods Range and Waitutu coast of Fiordland National Park.

Ground tracking and the aerial searches have located three kereru on Stewart Island:

- At Xmas a female was tracked to near Paua Beach at Patersons Inlet on Stewart Island 65
 kms from her capture site in Invercargill. She stayed in the vicinity of Paua Beach for about
 four months and was last seen there feeding on miro fruits. She has since moved on to parts
 unknown.
- A male kereru that had given us a signal from the Port William area on the northern coast of Stewart Island over the Xmas break subsequently returned to its capture site back on the outskirts of Invercargill (a 57 km one-way flight) but has since disappeared again.
- A second female has been located near East Ruggedy Hut in the north west of Stewart Island. In between this kereru being detected on Stewart Island in January and April it was seen in the Rayonier Forest near the Longwoods not far from Otautau, so it has made at least three flights across Foveaux Strait recently.

A male kereru that went AWOL in March was found at Omaui near Bluff in April feeding on ripe miro fruit. It recently returned to Queens Park. Another male kereru was located about the Pourakino Valley on the eastern approaches to the Longwoods Range, 36 km from Invercargill. This bird subsequently returned to the city but then vanished.

So, at this early stage of the radio-tracking phase of the project, it looks like we are dealing with a Southland-wide population, not a localized Invercargill one.

Birds With Bangles

Southland would have to be the 'tui sugar-water feeder capital of the world' - to date the DOC team know of 68 households that provide sugar-water to tui. At this time of year nectar is in short supply so tui make good use of these feeders (a great recipe for this mix is 1 cup of sugar to 2 litres of water).

So far 30 tui have been colour banded in and about Invercargill. Nearly all tui are wearing four colour bands - two per leg (including a stainless steel numbered band as part of this 4-band combination).

Do tui seasonally cross the ditch as well? It is highly likely that they do so the DOC researchers are looking for feedback from interested people on Stewart Island, particularly those who have sugarwater feeders, as you may see these colour-banded birds. If these bejewelled critters are spied then it would be great if their colour-band combination details were recorded. We have put together a data sheet to simplify the recording of observations. If observers would like one of these sheets then please let the DOC team know.

The purpose of the Rakiura Education Trust is to encourage and assist all Stewart Islanders to access education opportunities through the provision of grants.

Individuals, or groups, may apply for funding to undertake skill development courses, or workshops, or to bring a tutor to the island.

To be eligible for a grant, applicants must:

- 1. Have been residents of the island for at least 3 months prior to the application and currently be residing on the island.
- 2. Be seeking assistance to pursue educational opportunities that will develop or increase their skill level and knowledge with the intention of returning to the island to share their expertise with a group or other individuals. Therefore there must be obvious community benefits to be obtained from the project.

Applications for grants may be considered at anytime throughout the year. The actual amount granted for any one application, and the number of grants given in any year, may be set at the discretion of the Trust after considering the merits of the applications.

An interview with the applicant may also be required at the discretion of the Trust.

Recycling & Reuse Update



40 Tons saved from Landfill

In the seven months since weekly kerbside recycling collection came to Stewart Island and the Recovery Centre opened, an estimated 40 tons of recyclable resources have been stopped from going to landfill.

"On average 6.5 tons of resources are being saved from Landfill every month" says Ms Peterson, Waste Minimisation Coordinator (Southland District Council).

The Resource Recovery Centre has facilities for refuse disposal and - Greenwaste, Scrapmetal, Hazardous Waste, 2nd Chance Shed and Recycling.

Old Mattress put to good use

The Department of Conservation recently put new mattresses into their Huts on the Island. The mattresses were taken to the Recovery Centre (Horseshoe Point Road) for disposal. But not all were thrown out.





Southland District Council News by Cr Bill Todd

The proposed extension to the Oban sewerage scheme has got a lot of people thinking.

Planning for this project is well underway, but whether it gets the final go-ahead will depend on the amount of support there is from the property owners.

I would hope that everyone will want to proceed.

It will never be cheaper to get hooked up to a reticulated sewerage scheme. The Ministry of Health has agreed to pay half the capital cost and the Southland District Council will pay one sixth. That leaves property owners to pay one third of the construction costs, plus the price of connecting up to the scheme and an annual operating cost.

Most people who join the scheme now will pay around \$7000. If they decide to join in a few years time, maybe because they intend to subdivide, then it will cost more in the order of \$20,000 for each connection.

So it's worth thinking ahead. Being connected to the scheme will be a significant capital improvement for island properties.

There have already been three newsletters and public meetings to inform people about what's proposed.

Shortly there will be an invitation for people to make submissions to the Community Board, and the Board will take the public's views into account when deciding whether or not the scheme should go ahead.

So I would encourage everyone to think about this issue, make a submission when they have the chance, and let us know your views.
